Why are we here?

- The *Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA)* requires that each Title I School hold an Annual Meeting of Title I parents for the purpose of...
 - Informing you of your school's participation in Title I
 - Explaining the requirements of Title I
 - Explaining your rights as parents to be involved

What does it mean to be a Title I School?

- Being a Title I school means receiving federal funding (Title I dollars) to supplement the school's existing programs. These dollars are used for...
 - Identifying students experiencing academic difficulties and providing timely assistance to help these students meet the state's challenging content standards.
 - Purchasing supplemental staff/programs/materials/supplies
 - Conducting parental Involvement meetings/trainings/activities
 - Recruiting/Hiring/Retaining Highly Qualified Teachers

What is the LEA Title I Plan?

- The LEA Title I Plan addresses how the LEA will use Title I funds throughout the school system . Topics include:
 - Student academic assessments
 - Additional assistance provided struggling students
 - Coordination and integration of federal funds and programs
 - School programs including preschool, school choice, and supplemental educational services as applicable.
 - Parental Involvement Strategies, including the LEA Parental Involvement Plan

What's included in the school's Parental Involvement Policy?

- This plan addresses how the school will implement the parental involvement requirements of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). Components include...
 - How parents can be involved in decision-making and activities
 - How parental involvement funds are being used
 - How information and training will be provided to parents
 - How the school will build capacity in parents and staff for strong parental involvement

Curriculum

- Curriculum for Ironton Elementary includes:
 - Houghton Mifflin Harcourt for English and Language Arts K-5
 - SAVVAS Math Series for Math K-5
 - Harcourt (Social Studies)
 - SAVVAS (Science, Grades 3 & 5)

Assessments

- Assessments are used to help teachers plan instruction and to determine if a student is understanding the content presented in the classroom. Regular assessments are conducted to establish both baseline and quarterly diagnostic information. Proper student growth is measured and reported by grade level to the District Leadership Team (DLT).
- Moby Max intervention and enrichment computer-based assessments are used each day in TIGER TIME.
- Star Reading and Star Math diagnostic tools are utilized in grades K-5. Restart Readiness is utilized in grades 3-5.

Ohio State Tests

- In addition to district assessments, all students in grades 3-5 will participate in the Ohio State Tests (OST) in Reading and Math. Grade 5 students will also be assessed in Science
 - Five Proficiency Levels for the OST
 - Advanced
 - Accelerated
 - Proficient
 - Basic
 - Limited
 - Our goal is for your child to reach the “Proficient” level or higher on all sections of the OST.

OST Administration Dates

Fall Testing Window

- October 16, 2023-November 3, 2023: Grade 3 Reading

Spring Testing Window

- March 25, 2024 – April 26, 2024: Grades 3, 4, 5 Reading
- April 1, 2024-May 10, 2024: Grades 3, 4, 5 Math & Grade 5 Science

OST Results

- You will be notified of your child's OST results.
 - Fall Test Results by January 2024
 - Spring Test Results by August 2024
